

100 Sailing Craft To Greet Gothic

More than 100 sailing craft, ranging from ocean-going racing yachts to small dinghies, will greet the Royal yacht Gothic when it arrives at Outer Harbor on Saturday morning.

Led by the motor cruiser Beth, sailed by the Commodore of the Royal SA Yacht Squadron (Mr. Henry Rymill), the craft will form a laneway outside the Outer Harbor breakwater shortly before 11 a.m., when the Gothic is due.

About 500 people, consisting of members of the squadron and their families, will be aboard craft in the welcoming fleet.

The greeting will be a prelude to the biggest sailing fixture ever held in SA—the Queen's Regatta.

Arranged by the squadron, the regatta will include races for all classes of sailing craft in SA, and 116 entries have been received.

All metropolitan and country sailing clubs affiliated with the SA Yacht Racing Association will be represented.

Among the guests at the regatta will be a party from Government House, who will be aboard the flagship Nyroca, sailed by the squadron vice-commodore (Dr. A. L. Tostevin).

On Saturday evening the squadron will entertain nearly 800 yachtsmen and regatta officials at the Outer Harbor clubhouse.

University Plans

Provision has been made for 1,000 full-time University of Adelaide and Adelaide Teachers' College students to assemble in front of the Elder Conservatorium of Music on Wednesday when the Queen will attend the women's reception, arranged by the National Council of Women at the Bonython Hall at noon.

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The Warden of the University Union (Mr. F. T. Borland) said yesterday that students who had made written application to be present should call for tickets immediately.

All gates giving admission to the university grounds from North terrace will be locked on Tuesday night, and there would be no admission of vehicles through these gates before 2 p.m. the following day.

Adelaide Oval

A capacity crowd is expected at Adelaide Oval tomorrow when the Queen and the Duke arrive to watch the match between two combined country teams.

The Queen and Duke will arrive at the eastern gate of the oval at 4.15 p.m. and will drive around the northern half of the arena.

They will alight in front of the newly constructed Royal box in the George Giffen stand, where the

Minister of Works (Mr. McIntosh) will present the SACA president (Mr. R. F. Middleton).

Mr. Middleton will in turn present members of the Royal visit cricket committee, the players and umpires. Wives of cricket committee members will also be presented.

The Queen and the Duke will watch play until 5.10 p.m. when they will leave, circling the southern end of the ground before departing through the eastern gate.

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Joint host with Mr. Middleton will be former Australian Test captain, Mr. Vic Richardson, now the Country Carnival Cricket Association president.

The SACA secretary (Mr. W. H. Jeanes) said yesterday members would be admitted only at the northern gate, and the members' stand would be reserved exclusively for holders of members' and ladies' tickets.

Public Stands

The public stands had been reserved for country people, to whom tickets had been issued. Ticket-holders had to take their seats by 2 p.m.

The outer ground would be open to the public.

All gates would be opened at 11.30 a.m.

Mr. Jeanes said 13 rows two seats wide had been removed to make an open area in front of the Royal Box. Forty palms and flowers had been arranged to give a garden effect.

A red carpet would lead from the oval boundary to the box, which would be decorated in blue and gold.
